

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BULLNOSE RALLY REPORT.

Another day, another road rally and another cock-up at the start. It seems that making foul ups before the start of a rally is becoming a regular occurrence and Oxford Motor Club's Bullnose Rally was no exception. Having arranged to meet Pete at my house and set off from there, I wasn't entirely surprised when Pete turned up at my place, grinned and said "So, do we need our licences for signing on?" 'D'oh!' was the right answer for that question. We bundled in the car and set off immediately, hoping that we still had time to get back to Pete's place and head up from there. An hour later we got to Verwood, having got lost in a detour in Totton and then returned to Southampton because I had forgotten my club membership card!

Eventually we got to the event, and we weren't late for scruteneering. No problems there. I think getting the car through Hart Motor Club's pre event checks would have looked like a full MOT by comparison (although that wouldn't surprise anyone who has done their events).

This was the first event we had done together at National B level, although I had naved for Pete before on Clubman rallies. The only real differences between a National B and a Clubmans rally are that you need a licence, the slightly trickier navigation (still fairly straight forward compared to Wessex 12 car nav), a higher entry fee and sometimes a longer route. The other thing is that you compete against other seasoned crews from around the country and are included in the overall results. Now you get to know how good (or bad) you really are!

The event started with a 20 minute drive up the motorway on a non-competitive section before the main part of the rally. The idea was so you had time to plot the route for the second half of the event before driving it (not all events do this), so the last few stages would be driving with the navigator concentrating on bend calling. Unfortunately we were given an A4 sheet full of grid references that I didn't have time to completely plot. Looks like I was going to have my hands full in the pre-plot section.

The competitive sections started and we got cracking. Everything was going great until we passed our first codeboard. 'What was that Pete?', I shouted, having only just noticed the board with my head buried in the map. 'What was what?', came the reply. 'The codeboard, what was it?'. 'What codeboard?!?'. Oh shit. We reversed up smartish, got the code and got underway again.

After the rocky start, we settled into the event well. The naving was going well, Pete was driving great and we weren't losing much time. We got pissed off a few times though, with dodgy marshalling not giving us the times we got into the time controls and not getting waiting cars out of the way. We hoped this wasn't going to cost us places!

With much trepidation, I saw the stage numbers clock-up and realised the pre-plot section was approaching fast. I wouldn't have a lot of time to muck about so I tried to get as much down on the map after plotting the current stage and telling Pete where to go. I should take up circus performing after the experience I got juggling the two maps about.

Well into the pre-plot section, the event went into one of those slow motion sequences that happen when things are really happening very fast and going very wrong. I had left my

window open since the start of the event, as it was far too time consuming closing it after every control. I was swapping maps and noticed the pre-plot clue sheet flapping about by the window, holding on by one flimsy staple, with the distinct intention of making a new life in the Oxfordshire countryside. Then it was gone.

I screamed at Pete to stop and as we reversed up I saw, with much relief, the clue sheet sitting there on the tarmac, not flapping over a hedge in the wind or mopping up the contents of a ditch. I leapt from the car and, absolutely pumped with adrenaline, sprinted to the clues with a speed that Linford Christie would have been proud of.
